

STARBUCK GOOD AT PURSUITS.

Beat Hadfield Yesterday on the Track at Manhattan Beach.

HALF A LAP HANDICAP.

Stevens Captured Mile Open for the "Pros," and McFarland the Handicap.

HARD LUCK FOR TWO RIDERS.

Finished in Front, but One Didn't Know the Rules and the Other Had Been Lost in the Trial Shuffle.

Starbuck is a rider who is equally good in either paced or un-paced racing when the distance is of the middle variety, and even when it stretches to the century mark. Yesterday afternoon, at Manhattan Beach, the feature of the card of the Excelsior Boat Club meet was a pursuit race between Starbuck and Hadfield. His previous notable victory in this line happened in Madison Square Garden last winter, when Tom Luton, of Wales, suffered a defeat as convincing as was that meted out yesterday to the much discussed rider from Newark.

Practically All Over. It was all over practically, and when Hadfield completed his eleventh lap on the backstretch only a streak of daylight divided his rear wheel from the front of the other's machine. "Star" took pace for a couple of laps, but on the next to the concluding one of the race he jumped to the front and remained there to the finish, coming away from Hadfield in the final lap and winning with twenty yards to excess of the half lap that existed at the start.

Starbuck will next appear in the metropolis in a paced contest with Fred Titus, and the two will travel twenty miles behind the hotly contested mile race.

Kept It Going Lively. In the handicap the field was well bunched at the mile, but the usual loaf did not mar the race, as there was always one ready to take a turn at hitting it up in order to tire out the backmarker, who were somewhat blown through catching the front bunch so early in the game.

SOME FAT MEN RUN ALSO.

Fine Sport at the Annual Games of the Benjamin M. B. S.

Two little girls in blue lined up for a 100-yard race at Sulzer's Harlem River Park yesterday afternoon. This was the most interesting feature of the fourth annual games of the Alfred Benjamin & Co. Mutual Benefit Society.

By E. C. Carter. (Copyright, 1907, by W. R. Hearst.) Manchester, Eng., July 3.—The English athletic championships were held here this afternoon, and American athletes secured places in some of the events, although they could score no wins.

L. P. Sheldon, of the New York Athletic Club, and champion all-around amateur athlete of the United States, was second in the shot-putting event. The winner was Morgan, of Ireland, who made a put of 45 feet 4 inches. Sheldon's put was 44 feet 5 1/2 inches, a performance that would have won the event in any of the thirty years that the championships have been held.

Sheldon took third place in the hammer throwing contest, with a throw of 102 feet 2 inches.

There was a cold, blistering wind during the afternoon, and it undoubtedly interfered with the running of Walter S. Blipple, of the New York Athletic Club, in the half mile event. Blipple had the misfortune to be spiked on the turn of the track, but he managed to finish fourth.

Charles H. Kilpatrick, of Princeton University, was a spectator. He has arranged to run E. C. Bredin on July 31, August 4 and 11.

McGrane made the longest jump and B. Hasso was second. At that point in the proceedings Handicapper John J. Dixon, who had been trying to get a line on the athletes, retired in despair.

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
