HANNA MOVES TO THE WHITE HOUSE
TROLLEY GR FOR WESTCH

He Sleeps Each Night in Garfield's Old Room.
 Report of a Union Railway Project to Capture the Entire County.

DODGING OFFICE-SEEKERS. WHITNEY IN THE LEAD.

Potomac Mosquitoes and Ant-Election Promises Drove Him from His Hotel.
 Sheehan, Flower, Lamont, Vreeland and Crimmins Among the Others Interested.

Washington, July 12.—Senator Mark Hanna has moved into the White House. It was a constant campaign charge that he and not McKinley would be the real occupant, and this change of base seems to have been the result.



Mrs. Adelaide Holst—Who Knows Where She Is?

HER disappearance Friday night from the corner of Seventh and Third Avenue was as quick and complete as though she had vanished from the earth. She is twenty-four years old, the wife of Ernest Holst, a bartender at No. 31 Pearl Street. With her husband and five-year-old daughter she lived at No. 222 East Fifty-sixth Street.

Friday night Mrs. Holst, accompanied by her daughter, went to visit her mother, who lives at No. 178 East Eighty-fifth Street. When she started home she said she felt a bit weak, but thought a walk in the fresh air would do her good. Mrs. Canfield, her mother, accompanied her. The two women and the little girl walked to the corner of Seventh and Third Avenue. The child was a short distance in advance. Mrs. Canfield's attention was momentarily attracted by a display in a show window. When she turned again Mrs. Holst was gone. Thinking that Mrs. Holst had missed them Mrs. Canfield took the little girl to the Holsts' flat, in Fifty-sixth Street. Mrs. Holst did not come home, nor has she been seen since. Her husband says there is no reason to apprehend suicide. He fears foul play. The woman wore on Friday night a white sailor hat, a pink shirt waist, blue tie, russet belt, gray skirt and low russet shoes.

To lead color to the assertion. Worried by the warm weather, pestered by hotel flies and mosquitoes, and run half to death by the office seekers he has found a temporary asylum in the Presidential mansion. His many afflictions the ubiquitous office seeker has tried him the most sorely. Told McKinley All.
 At length Senator Hanna's careworn countenance caused his friend, the President, to inquire what might be the matter. Hanna was happy to find so easily a friend in whom he could confide and without any mental reservations he told him the story of his recent disappearance. The President in turn told his friend that life in the White House was not altogether one "grand, sweet song"; that the mosquitoes from the Potomac Plains were larger, had louder throats and sharper bills and were more persistent company than those in the Senator's hotel; but that there was safety from the politicians during the night.

As Hanna agreed that McKinley had a right to know the best of it, the latter invited him to bring his night shirt and tooth brush and come across to the White House to try it a while.

In the still night of Saturday, like a grim shadow, Senator Hanna, with a package about the size of a Summer girl's bathing suit under his arm, started for the Park and ran into the mansion, pursued only by the mosquitoes. He was fanned, rubbed down and put to bed in the room on the southwest corner of the house, to dream of royalty and wounded Presidents. He was happy to find so easily a friend in whom he could confide and without any mental reservations he told him the story of his recent disappearance. The President in turn told his friend that life in the White House was not altogether one "grand, sweet song"; that the mosquitoes from the Potomac Plains were larger, had louder throats and sharper bills and were more persistent company than those in the Senator's hotel; but that there was safety from the politicians during the night.

THE FUEL OF THE FUTURE.
 Savages go after their fuel; civilized people have it brought to them. SCARE FOR COMMUTERS.
 Cylinder Head of the White Mountain Express Blew Out at the Mamaroneck Station.
