MAY LOSE ONLY TWO DISTRICTS.

Seven Out of the Eleven Are Sure for the Free Coinage Candidates—Only Two Conceded to the Gold Men—Remaining Ones in Doubt.

Louisville, Ky., Oct. 18.—Both parties—gold and silver—have put up their strongest men for the Congressional contests in Kentucky, and the district campaigns are creating as much interest as the Bryan and McKinley affairs.

Allowing for all kinds of ill luck, the Congressional delegation will stand seven for free coinage and four for gold.

Dr. W. Godfrey Hunter, candidate to succeed himself in the Third District, has invoked the aid of the National Campaign Committee.

Contributions are sent by officials of the road. President Sloan and Superintendent Reasoner both deny that the officials are responsible for them.

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State is still a Democratic proposition. One may journey from the mountains to the river and back again to the hills over another route and not note any conditions or phenomena that will warrant a doubt as to the character of the State.

Palmer Supporters Few. There are more free silver Republicans in Kentucky than there are supporters of the Palmer and Buckner ticket.

Brown's Strong Candidate. The Fifth District is composed of the county of Jefferson. Louisville is the principal town, and although it is naturally Democratic by a small vote.

John Young Brown, former Governor of this State, accepted the silver candidacy this year, and Mr. Evans's expectations at once experienced a frost.

Delaware presents this year perhaps a more complicated situation with regard to national and State issues than any other State in the Union.

These tickets, as they now stand on file in the offices of the clerks of the peace, are: Union, or Addicks Republicans—For Governor, John Henry Hoffecker.

Regular Democrats—For Governor, John C. Higgins. Regular Democratic ticket—For Governor, Ebe W. Tunnell.

Two Republican Tickets. The Republicans are now united on one set of electors, but as each faction will have its own ticket in the field there will be practically two Republican electoral tickets to be voted for.

Two of the most important results to be obtained by the election in Delaware this year are the calling of a Constitutional Convention to frame a new Constitution for the State, and the election of a Legislature which will elect a United States Senator.

The Republicans are hopelessly divided on the Legislative ticket, each faction having their own men in the field.
