## MOVING TRUCK ON FIRE.

A Spark from Driver Richard's Pipe Caused the Blaze and Created Excitement in Broadway.

A truck driven by Henry Richards, of No. 554 West Thirty-fifth street, took fire in Broadway, between Thirty-first and Thirty-second streets, yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

A spark from the pipe which Richards was smoking was blown among some boxes in the truck, which contained supplies of the Interior Conduit and Isolation Company, of No. 527 West Thirty-fourth street.

The horses became frightened and dashed down Broadway at a furious rate. An immense crowd gathered. Roundsmen Dixon, of the West Third Street Station, stopped the horses before Richards suffered any injury from the fire. An alarm was sent in and the blaze was extinguished by Bremen. Almost all the goods on the truck were destroyed. The loss was estimated at \$250. The truck, which was also badly burned, was owned by John Lawson, of No. 554 West Thirty-fifth street.

## DIED ON SWEETHEART'S GRAVE.

Young German, on Hearing Bad News, Goes to Cemetery and Kills Himself.

English, Ind., Feb. 5.—Just after noon today Alexis Garvin, of Bremen, Germany, committed suicide upon the grave of Miss Constanza Peters at White Sulphur, near here.

Garvin arrived yesterday, expecting to marry Miss Peters, and was told that she had died of consumption three weeks ago. He seemed stricken with grief and wandered gloomily about, finally going to the cemetery, where he shot himself. He will be buried here and his friends in Germany notified.

## Live Stock Society's Defeat.

The show given by the Live Stock Society of America was not successful. After applying all the funds of the society toward the payment of its indebtedness, there remained a deficit of about \$5,000. Several of the creditors have sued the company and obtained judgment. One of the judgment creditors has now announced his intention of endeavoring to hold the stockholders individually liable. All the stockholders have been asked to meet at the rooms of the Jockey Club, No. 112 Fifth avenue, February 9.

## Such Indictments Useless.

"What is the use of having a man indicted if you have no evidence against him?" said Justice Aspinall in the County Court, Brooklyn, yesterday, as he dismissed the charge against Ross Torriano, at the request of the District-Attorney, who declared he had no evidence against the defendant. Torriano had been indicted for burglary.
