



CHAPLAIN FRANCIS P. DUFFY CONDUCTING RELIGIOUS SERVICES AT THE GRAVE OF LIEUT. QUENTIN ROOSEVELT, YOUNGEST SON OF COL. AND MRS. THEODORE ROOSEVELT, NEAR CHAMERY, FRANCE, THE BURIAL HAVING BEEN MADE BY GERMAN AVIATORS ON THE SPOT WHERE LIEUT. ROOSEVELT'S MACHINE WAS BROUGHT DOWN BACK OF THE GERMAN LINES ON JULY 14. A FEW DAYS LATER THE AMERICANS ADVANCED OVER THIS TERRITORY AND AN AMERICAN AVIATOR FOUND THE GRAVE. THE PHOTOGRAPH SHOWS THE RUDE CROSS ERECTED BY THE GERMANS, AND THE NEW CROSS RAISED BY THE AMERICANS, ALSO THE WHEELS FROM LIEUT. ROOSEVELT'S DESTROYED MACHINE.




