

In the lower left hand corner of the picture appears the dome of St. Peter's, the largest Christian place of worship in the world. The Vatican Palace proper is in the center foreground, with the flower beds of Pope Pius X immediately adjacent. The white church spire in the center background is that of the Church of Lourdes, erected by donations from French pilgrims. The site of the Papal residence was formerly occupied by the gardens of Nero, and Pope Symmachus (481-514) was the first to build upon it. The present palace was the work of D. Fontana, built under Sixtus V, Clement VIII and Paul V. It covers 13 1/4 acres and contains 1,100 rooms. With its chapels, decorated chambers and museums, the Vatican forms one of the greatest treasure houses of art in the world. The Vatican Gardens are the only place in which the Pope can take exercise in the open air.
