A VOICE FROM THE DEAD.

Like an accusing voice from the grave come the papers found in the desk of John S. Hopkins, the cashier of the People's Bank, of Philadelphia, who committed suicide, introduced in evidence on Wednesday in the examination of Senator M. S. Quay, his son, R. R. Quay, Attorney Charles H. McKee, of Pittsburg, and former State Treasurer B. J. Haywood, accused of conspiracy to use the public moneys of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for their own use.

EDDORA CHARGED WITH MURDER. HER DEEP LOVE MAY SAVE SHAW.

"Nance's" Daughter, Her Son Harry and Young Oxley Are Indicted.

SHE CANNOT BE FOUND.

Is Out on Bail on a Lesser Charge and Is Expected to Surrender.

NEW WITNESSES HAVE APPEARED.

London Police Are Confident They Have the Eidgepott Physician and Not Mrs. Wilbur.

Bridgeport, Conn., Oct. 6.—The police are looking for Eudora Guilford. The Grand Jury sitting in extraordinary session today, returned a true bill for murder in the second degree against the daughter of Dr. Nancy Guilford.

Harry Oxley was surprised at his home in Southington late this afternoon by Sheriff Helster, of this city, and rearrested on the warrant charging him with murder.

The jury was in session all day behind closed doors. True bills for murder in the second degree were found against Rose Drayton, Nancy's negro landlady, and Harry Guilford, the doctor's son, as well as against Eudora and Oxley. Young Guilford and the Drayton woman are already in jail.

It is believed that Eudora, anticipating the result of the deliberations of the Grand Jury, has gone to the home of friends, where she will remain until tomorrow, when it is thought she may consent to be arrested and endeavor to have a bond fixed at once. Were she caught to-night she would be compelled to pass the night in jail, as there is no Superior Court Judge here to fix a bond.

While the indictment of Harry Guilford was under discussion two witnesses appeared who have not heretofore figured in the case. They are Captain Merwin Miller and George Kelley, members of the crew of the yacht upon which Harry was employed as cook. It will be recalled that Harry claimed he was aboard the yacht
