

MAN CAUGHT IN DOCTOR'S HOUSE THOUGHT HIMSELF AT HOME. GIVES RIGHT ADDRESS.

William Rowland gave a remarkably life-like impersonation of a burglar until he was asked his name and address, and then he related his burlesque precedent by telling the truth. This remarkable circumstance suggests the idea that he may be selling the truth also when he declares that, in breaking into the premises of Dr. Lewis E. Meeker, No. 44 Linden avenue, Williamsburg, he thought he was entering his mother's house.

Whether Rowland was a real burglar or only a sham burglar, he gave Dr. Meeker and his family all the vivid sensations belonging to the capture of the genuine article at the point of a pistol. The physician was awakened at 3 o'clock yesterday morning by the clangor of his burglar alarm. Taking his revolver, he rapped down to the basement, accompanied by his son George. In the dining room, where the gas was burning dimly, they came across a stranger. "Throw up your hands, or I'll blow your brains out," commanded Dr. Meeker, in tones that belied his name.

The intruder obeyed immediately, and continued to exhibit perfect docility while the doctor ordered him to a station a little beyond the telephone. The doctor himself called up Police Headquarters as well as he could with one hand, keeping the pistol pointed in the direction of his uninvited guest. Meanwhile George Meeker had aroused the rest of the family, and a bevy of white-robed figures flitted into the room, uttering many exclamations of indignation, and showing how ready were the neighbors to have communitated into the receiver the fact that he had captured a house-breaker. Dr. Meeker sat down and assumed a reserved posture of calm keeping the appointments burglar well covered. Other inquisitive members of the house discovered Rowland had entered by forcing a window.

HAD STOLEN DOCTOR'S GOODS. Man Arrested in Brooklyn Believed to Be One Long Wanted.

In the arrest on Saturday afternoon of George Freeman for robbing the office of Dr. Rachel A. Nottage at No. 669 Macdonough street, Brooklyn, and that of Dr. Edward E. James K. Bagley, a newspaper man of this city, died of heart failure at his home, No. 39 West Ninety-ninth street, yesterday morning. Mr. Bagley was the oldest son of the late Colonel James Bagley, who succeeded Colonel Corcoran in command of the Sixty-ninth Regiment, N. Y. N. G. during the Civil war. He was graduated from St. Francis Xavier's College, and was on the staff of the old New York Star, afterward becoming one of Henry George's helpers on the Leader. He was at one time editor of England's News Bureau, and contributed his articles to Drake's and other magazines.

STABBED HIS WIFE IN A QUARREL. Mrs. McGuigan Was Clubbing Her Husband When He Used a Bread Knife in Self-Defence.

Daniel McGuigan, a salesman, thirty-eight years old, stabbed his wife Mary at their home, No. 317 Barrow street, Jersey City, shortly before 3 p. m. yesterday. Mrs. McGuigan was taken to the City Hospital, where it was said she would die, and her husband was locked up by the police. McGuigan went home slightly intoxicated yesterday afternoon and after upbraiding his wife because the dinner was not ready said he would take their little girl out for a walk. When Mrs. McGuigan refused to let the child go her husband called her a vile name. Mrs. McGuigan attacked him with a club, driving him into the kitchen, where he caught up a bread knife that lay on the table and plunged it into her left breast.

OPIMUM KILLED LEONARD. Three Women Discharged from Custody After the Autopsy.

Lillie Lawrence and Sidney Worth, of No. 253 West Thirty-ninth street, and Daisy Andrews, of No. 160 West Fifty-fourth street, the women arrested in connection with the death of E. Fox Leonard on Saturday afternoon, were discharged yesterday by Coroner Bausch after Dr. O'Hanlon had performed an autopsy and found that Leonard's death was due to opium poisoning. William Wingeat Hubbard, who knew Leonard, said that the young man enjoyed an income from an estate left by his parents, who died when he was an infant. The family belonged to Louisiana.

FORMER MASTER WORKMAN SOVEREIGN TELLS OF "LABOR BAYONETED." James R. Sovereign, former General Master Workman of the Knights of Labor, was accorded the privileges of the floor by the Central Federated Union, in Clarendon Hall, yesterday afternoon.

He made an address to the delegates in favor of the miners of the Cour de Lene district, in which he savagely arraigned General Merriam and the turning of the Federal bayonets against law-abiding citizens. He brought his audience up standing, so thoughtfully did he appeal to their feelings. "There was a strike on April 20," Mr. Sovereign said, "and a \$250,000 concentrator was destroyed. This concentrator belonged to John D. Rockefeller and the Standard Oil crowd." As a partial excuse for this act, the speaker explained how the company had failed grievously to keep vital agreements with the men, which forced the men to strike.

IT IS SCHLEY DAY TO-DAY AND HIS 'BOYS' CELEBRATE. Brooklyn's Men Will Parade and Dance the Varsouviana Which They Have Dedicated to the Journal.

With band playing and banners flying, the crew of the cruiser Brooklyn will march from their ship at the Navy Yard to the Brooklyn entrance of the Bridge at 9 a. m. to-day. There they will take cars to Glendale Park, where they will celebrate "Schley Day," or the anniversary of the victory over Cervera.

CHARLES R. POPE, ACTOR AN EX-CONSUL DEAD. He Built Pope's Theatre in St. Louis and Was Well Known Throughout the Country.

Charles R. Pope, consul for the United States at Toronto, Canada, under the Harrison Administration, and formerly a wealthy citizen of St. Louis, died yesterday morning at No. 325 West Fifty-sixth street, where he had lived since 1883. He leaves a widow, two sons and two daughters. He was sixty-eight years old. Before going into politics Mr. Pope was one of the great stars of the theatre. Twenty years ago he built Pope's Theatre at Ninth and Olive streets, St. Louis, which he personally directed.

MRS. M. RUTHERFORD DEAD. Aged and Wealthy Woman Passes Away at New London.

New London, Conn., July 2.—Margaret Rutherford, eighty-four years old, died on her summer cottage in the Pequot colony at 4 a. m. She was the mother of John R. Rutherford, owner of the New York Yacht Club steam yacht "Margaret." She was a very wealthy woman. She made the Plaza Hotel her headquarters in New York when not travelling. She arrived on her yacht a fortnight ago.

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
