

RACING AT THE SPA BEGINS WEDNESDAY

Brighton Cup an Uncertain Event with Ben Holladay Out.

By Francis Trevelyan. The Brighton Beach meeting is drawing to its close, though some of the best events remain to be decided, and racing men are thinking about packing up their traps preparatory to a month's sojourn at Saratoga.

Big Season for Saratoga.

That Saratoga will have the biggest season it has had in many years, if not bigger than ever before, is sure. The shutting down of all the local tracks from August 9 to 26 means that anyone who wants racing will have to journey to the famous spa for his fun.

Brighton Cup No Gift for Anyone.

At the present time there is every prospect that the Brighton Cup, to be run for next Saturday, will provide a race of such importance that it will not be a gift for any one horse.

Paget Well Represented.

The race, reckoning on half a dozen starters, will be worth \$7,575 gross, of which \$6,175 to the winner. The majority of the entries seem to have a right to start in the absence of any single horse to scare out opposition.

Meeting Too Long.

The Brighton Beach meeting is telling, and will yet tell in more unmistakable terms, the old familiar story. No matter how faithful your stewards may be, no matter how sincere the effort to make the racing honest, the close season has stretched beyond a limit of any sane racing days will generate scandal inevitably.

Competition will be at eighteen holes, medal play, teams to be composed of members of the same club. The finals of the three cup games will be played on Friday at thirty-three holes. The week's sport will end up on Saturday with a thirty-six hole medal play for the Shinnecock Cup.

Aside from the interesting exhibitions, of which this tourney will be productive, the golfers enjoy at Shinnecock Hills the quiet surroundings and magnificent conditions which generally prevail at these links.
