

ADDITIONAL LAWS  
THE ARBITRATE.

Kansas Has a Court with  
Power to Settle  
Strikes.  
NONE EXIST OUT THERE.  
Griffin's Amendment Will Force  
Corporations to Act  
Fairly.

Several means of incorporating into law  
the principle of compulsory arbitration  
between public servant corporations and  
their employees have been suggested to the  
Journal since it presented the issue to its  
readers.

It has been demonstrated that the principle  
of the State has the right and the  
power to intervene with force between cor-  
porations which owe to the State their  
very means of doing business, due to the  
gift of valuable franchises, and their em-  
ployees is soundly legal, equitable in morals  
and agreeable to enlightened public policy.  
There is time between now and the No-  
vember elections to formulate this princi-  
ple into a concrete law to be demanded of  
the Legislature.

The State of Kansas has already put the  
principle into execution by means of a  
court of wider powers than are contem-  
plated in the Journal's proposals. The  
court, suggested by a Journal correspond-  
ent as a model for New York legislation, is  
vested with arbitrary authority, and is  
between all corporations doing business in  
Kansas and their employees.

**Kansas Controls Strikes.**  
The Kansas law contains a strike provi-  
sion which has not been tested since the  
enactment went into effect with the first  
day of this year. The provision requires  
that when a corporation which is involved  
in a strike, or three employees of such a  
corporation, make application to a new judi-  
cial body, known as the Court of Visti-  
ation, for an arbitration the court shall take  
judicial charge of the strike.

The court has power, if it deem such ac-  
tion necessary, to appoint a receiver for  
the corporation while the strike is pending.  
The court sets a day for hearing both  
parties to the contention. Witnesses are  
examined and counsel for the corporations  
and employees are allowed to handle their  
cases just as civil suits would be.

The orders which the court may make  
binding on both parties alike, and may be  
enforced by means of severe penalties.  
"I believe strikes and labor troubles are  
a thing of the past in Kansas," said Jus-  
tice L. O. Cream, in a recent in-  
terview on the merits of the law.

More nearly adapted to the lengths to  
which conservative New York would go, is  
the provision in an amendment to the  
code prepared by Anthony J. Griffin and  
submitted to the Journal. Mr. Griffin  
proposes to erect the present State Board  
of Conciliation and Arbitration to a court with  
powers similar to those of the Supreme  
Court, but with jurisdiction only in labor  
disputes.

**The Law Proposed.**  
Voluntary arbitration through boards  
named by the court is provided for all who  
desire it, but for the corporations enjoying  
public franchises this section is drawn:

Section 284—Compulsory Arbitration. When-  
ever any controversy or difference exists be-  
tween an employer, whether an individual,  
partnership or corporation, and the employ-  
ees thereof, where the relations between the  
parties are of a quasi-public nature, and  
where both parties owe obligations to the public  
by reason of the public nature of the business,  
occupation or calling in which they are en-  
gaged, so that a cessation of said business,  
occupation or calling by a strike or lockout  
would impede public traffic or transportation,  
interfere with the mails or otherwise cause  
public suffering or inconvenience, it shall be  
lawful where the parties do not voluntarily  
submit the said dispute for arbitration, that  
either party may apply to the court for an ad-  
judication of the said dispute, and the court  
shall have jurisdiction to make such an ad-  
judication, and to enforce its determination by  
the means in its power. The court shall specify the time of hearing,  
which shall not be less than three nor  
more than six days from the date thereof.
