

Big Holiday Crowd Treated to a Bouquet of Surprises at the Saratoga Course.

Saratoga, Aug. 12.—In spite of a bar track and dull, threatening skies this was the best day that the Saratoga Racing Association has seen in many years. The sport was spoiled by the condition of the going to a great extent, but the grand stand was filled from end to end with a crowd that shouted lustily at the slightest provocation, in striking contrast to the usual phlegmatic conduct of the racegoers at the "Spa."

The Grand Prize at a mile and a furlong was no such race as had been hoped for, and this was solely due to the going, which was very cuppy and holding. May Hempstead was favored, though her name was not sent out over night, but the pencil went through the names of Banastar, Ethelbert and Azucena, leaving only four to sport silk.

The Don was a tremendously hot favorite, and those who had fondly hoped to get even money or at least 4 to 5 against were disappointed when 1 to 2 was the best quotation, and 1 to 3 was eagerly taken at the finish. May Hempstead also ran.

Kraenzlein Wins Three First Prizes.
