Sigmund Feust, One of 36 Examined, Passes Through the Mill.

UP ON PHILOSOPHERS.

"C. Drum" a Mysterious Factor in the Case—Defendant Gaining Flesh.

Thirty-six more takersmen were examined yesterday before Recorder Goff. Thirty-five were excused for one reason and another. The remaining one, Sigmund Feust, was chosen as the eighth taker to sit in the trial of Roland H. Mollieux.

Feust, who is forty-eight years old, lives at No. 718 East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, and is a real estate owner. His strong German accent led the lawyers to question him minutely on his knowledge of English. When asked if he understood it, he answered with solemnity: "I have read the works of Herbert Spencer."

Recorder Goff, inquiring further, learned that Feust was likewise conversant with the writings of Darwin, Huxley and John Stuart Mill, but had read none of the German philosophers at all.

Feust complained of ill health, but Recorder Goff, in assigning him to the jury box, said: "I do not think the course of this trial will be such as to endanger your health. We will try to be as considerate as possible."

It is worth a day's waiting in court to watch Mollieux during the administration of the oath to a juror. From beginning to end of the formula, he looks straight into the eyes of man after man, who has been chosen to decide the question of life or death for him. If he were out of breath he could not be more immobile. It would take a microscopic camera to demonstrate so much as the motion of an eyelash.

Stories that Mollieux is wasting away are like old wives' tales. An athletic trainer would say that the chief character in the drama which is now in its first act before the Recorder was talking on at the rate of about three pounds a day.

A young man who said he had been called as a witness in the case sent in a note to Mr. Osborne yesterday, signing the name "C. Drum." None of the counsel on either side would admit knowing who or what he was.

At the afternoon session, Detective McCaffery brought to the court room door a young man, brown-haired and blue-eyed, and wearing a light overcoat, black derby hat and black shoes and laced shoes. In an ante-room, Assistant District Attorney Connor talked with them and then sent for Osborne, who said afterward that the visitor was a friend of his, not concerned in the Mollieux case.


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ACTRESS CHARLES COGHLAN'S HEAD

Galveston, Tex., Nov. 27.—Charles Coghlan, the actor, who has been ill here since October 30 with acute gastritis, died this morning.

"The Royal Box" Company had been playing through Texas with the understudy as star.

Charles Coghlan was fifty-six years of age. At the time of his death he had nearly finished his dramatization of "Vanity Fair" for his daughter, Gertrude. The body will be taken to Prince Edward Island, his summer home. The manager of the company has been instructed by wire to cancel all further engagements.

Charles Coghlan, as an actor, stood in the first rank, and while he had many of the eccentricities of genius, his death makes certain in the dramatic field that will not be filled easily. Last season the play "The Royal Box," written by himself, was one of the best attractions of the year.
