MANHATTAN CONTINUES TO DROP.

Western Union Also Loses in Sympathy. Gain Not Over One Per Cent Above the Closing Prices of Friday.

Wall Street, Saturday, Dec. 19. London did not take alarm over the Cuban situation, and instead of pouring securities upon the local market, as feared, sent quotations 1/2 to 1 1/4 per cent higher than the close of our market last night and bought stocks steadily. Advices also came from Washington conveying the impression that the House of Representatives would not act in favor of Cuban independence.

The market opened about 1 per cent higher, in sympathy with London, and the partial restoration of confidence stopped the urgent liquidation which caused the panic yesterday. Liquidation, however, continued throughout the two hours of business, and several times the market became weak in tone. It was feverish and nervous until just before the close, when a firm tone was assumed. The closing prices, however, were only fractionally above the opening.

Naturalist W. Harvey Brown Writes the Story from the Wilds of Africa.

Ride of Many Miles Looking for the Body of the Former New Yorker.

Slain as Scores of Settlers Had Been, by the Treacherous Natives Who Are in Rebellion.

BROWN'S OWN ESCAPE FROM DEATH.

Fighting a Party of Ten, He Killed Four, and Was Himself Shot by a Native Who Was But Four Paces Away.

Herbert Hedge Eyre, of this city, has been murdered in that section of the Mashona country in South Africa which is called Rhodesia. The information received is contained in a letter dated September 23 from another American, W. Herbert Brown, to W. T. Hornaday, director of the New York Zoological Park.

Mr. Brown went to West Africa in the interest of the National Museum at Washington, and is now on his way home with a collection of African specimens. He has been away seven years, was one of the founders of the town of Salisbury, which is the capital of Rhodesia, has achieved fortune as a farmer and political prominence by attacking Cecil Rhodes. His party of 2000 Africans and a detachment of the British army, which he led, were killed by a party of ten natives, who were armed with spears and bows.
