

L. A. W. AND SANCTION FEES

Doubts Are Expressed As to Whether Committee Can Make Reduction.

The Rate Is Not Excessive, and Was Made in the Interests of the Parent Body.

SMALL REWARDS FOR PROFESSIONALS

Leading Members of the Trade Maintain That They Intended to Abolish Racing Teams Before Class B Was Eliminated.

According to information from L. A. W. headquarters in Boston, the Executive Committee has decided, in case the Racing Board concurs, to reduce the sanction fee for race meeters from \$10 to \$5.

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HUGHES ORDERED OUT.

The Interior Department Sends a Peremptory Message to Arizona's Deposed Governor.

Washington, April 1.—The Interior Department authorities, upon receipt of a telegram from Secretary of State Bruce, of Arizona, that Governor Hughes refused to vacate his office, to-day sent the following telegrams to both gentlemen:

"Phoenix, Ariz. 'You have been removed from the office of Governor of Arizona. The President directs that you turn over the office to the Secretary at once.'"

"Mr. Hughes has been removed as Governor. The President directs that you take possession of the office as acting Governor, under the law."
