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Executive officers of the commission are allowing themselves. The foundation will be made to cut down the salary of the secretary of the national commission from \$10,000 a year to \$3,000. The salary of the president will not be cut. The army of the commission will be reduced to 100 men. The commission will be recommended to be dismissed. It will also be recommended that but one meeting a year of the national commission be held. It is estimated by the Bureau of Navigation that about a thousand new enlistments will be required within the next sixty days in order to make up the complement of the new vessels about to go in commission, and several of the vessels whose crews will soon be required for discharge on account of the expiration of their terms of enlistment. All the men at present available at the various recruiting stations will be taken up by the vessels of the squadron of evolution, which will soon start for southern waters.
