FATHER OF THE LONDON PASTOR H. M. C. DEAD. The Rev. G. M. Van Derlip Passes Dr. Hanson Declares It Was a Certainty and That the Apostles Were Not Deceived.

COLLECTED MANY PAINTINGS. When in London He Discovered a Small Y. M. C. A. Organization and Led in Its Great Development Here. The English Preacher Who Is Occupying Dr. Lorimer's Pulpit Will Visit Other Cities Before Sailing.

After an illness of more than a year, the Rev. George Mairs Van Derlip, father of the Young Men's Christian Association in this country, died on Saturday at his home, No. 675 Quincey street, Brooklyn, of valvular disease of the heart.

Mr. Van Derlip was widely known as a clergyman and a writer. He was born at Argyle, Washington county, N. Y., in June, 1832. His grandfather, the Rev. George Mairs, was one of the original founders of the Young Men's Christian Association in this country.

While living in London he discovered the Young Men's Christian Association, a religious organization having a Bible class and reading and lunch rooms. He described the association and its work in one of his letters to the Rev. Dr. Lorimer.

He was a collector of paintings and many of his collections are now in the Metropolitan Museum of Art, of which he was one of the founders and the first director. His daughter, Mrs. Anna Van Derlip Weston, survives him.
