District Attorney Reasserts His Anxiety to Obtain Evidence Against Contractors—Murphy's Brother-in-Law Sent to Tombs and Wire Shrieks in Court.

"I had hoped my position was so well understood that I would not have to restate it. If any person or persons, employer or employee, will put in my possession evidence, or put me on track of evidence, which will warrant the prosecution of any contractor or manufacturer in connection with 'grafting' I will present that person or set of persons as earnestly as any labor leader has been prosecuted. I can say no more."
