Business men of St. Louis have complained to Secretary Root that the Merchants' Bridge Company is now dominated by the Terminal Association, which owns the famous Eads Bridge. An inquiry put on foot by the Secretary of War seems to substantiate the charge, and has resulted in the communication to the bridge company.

In connection with the charges is a story of an alleged absolute monopoly, with consequent extortionate tolls, which are said to be responsible for the creation of the city of East St. Louis.
