His murder was deliberately planned. He was lured to a lonely spot in the Jackson suburb and there his skull was crushed by a club in the hands of William McElroy, Sr. The liveryman who saw the three men, Cantrel, McElroy, Sr., and Buckner, in the carriage with the murdered man after the murder had been committed and the tailor, who next day washed blood from Cantrel's clothing, have been found.

The Cleveland police have discovered a witness who casts further light upon the crime and at the same time develops the fact that in the cellar of the North street rendezvous the body of a third victim was hidden.

The identity of this body is still a mystery. Neither Cantrel nor Martin has made any admission.

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HEIRS LOSE \$67,000 SUIT.

Janitor's Fortune Was Made Principally in Tips from Tenants.

Special Dispatch to the Herald. POST OFFICE, N. Y., Wednesday.—By a decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court a suit for \$67,000, brought by the heirs of Charles Saker against the New York Life Insurance and Trust Company, has been settled in favor of the defendant.

Saker was janitor of the company's building in Wall street. He died in 1886, leaving an estate valued at \$150,000. The estate, principally in stocks and bonds, was left to his children and grandchildren.

The janitor had been with the insurance company for forty years, and as much of his wealth had been made by tips obtained from the company's customers.

Two years ago one of the heirs sued to compel the company to remunerate the janitor for the benefits of the building, which it sold during the Spanish War at an alleged loss.

The plaintiff estimated that the difference between the amounts the stocks were sold for and their market value at the time he brought the action was \$67,000.

Surrogate Sullivan decided the case in favor of the heirs, and was upheld by the four courts. The company then appealed.
