INDIAN OUTLAWS

Posse in Pursuit of Slayers of Deputy Marshal Gilstrap in Cherokee County Fight.

WOUNDED MAN WILL DIE. May Be Days Before News of Arrest Can Be Brought, as Country is Desolate.

YINFA, I. T., Tuesday. — One hundred armed men have gone into the Cherokee country in pursuit of the Wickliffe band of Indian outlaws who on Sunday afternoon ambushed a United States Marshal's posse of six men, killing I. L. Gilstrap, a deputy marshal, and wounding "Dick" Carey, a posse man.

MR. COULDEIDN'T VIOLATE THE LAW

Right for Him to Give Verdi's Requiem Mass on Sunday Night, Court Says.

Acquittal of Opera House Director Hailed with Joy by Theatre Managers as Blow at Police.

Heinrich Conried, director of the Metropolitan Opera House, walked out of Special Sessions Court yesterday, after he had been found innocent of violating any law by giving Verdi's Requiem Mass in the opera house on Sunday night, February 11 last.

He was jubilant as was his lawyer, A. J. Dittenhofer, who remarked that had Mr. Conried been declared guilty the city of New York also would have been declared guilty of breaking its own laws whenever it gives a Sunday afternoon concert in the public parks.

The three Wickliffe boys are not horse thieves nor robbers in any sense, as has been stated. They began their career by robbing a man and were charged with several murders committed mostly in their attempts to escape.

TWELFTH MAN SAYS MURDER. Coroner's Jury Disagrees and Investigation of Case Will Be Resumed.

Eleven members of a jury under Coroner Harburger yesterday concluded that Max Kruger, who died of a bullet wound in the head in his home, No. 43 West Thirty-second street, on February 23, committed suicide. The twelfth man, however, who was a member of the jury, was of the opinion that the man was murdered.

ENDS LIFE OF 'L' TRACKS. Man Believed to Be Henry Peterson Leaps in Front of Train.

Bearing in his pocket a notebook in which was written "Henry Peterson, bandmaster, U. S. R. S. Franklin, Navy Yard, Norfolk, Va., a young man jumped in front of a northbound Second avenue train at the Forty-second street station yesterday forenoon and was ground to pieces. The car had to be jacked up to get the body out. For an hour the line was blocked, and police reserves were called out to keep the impatient throng from falling on the tracks.

POSTAL CLERK DIES BY GAS. Worry, due to illness, probably caused William Banks, a clerk in the foreign branch of the Post Office at West and Morton streets, to kill himself by inhaling illuminating gas, early yesterday.

EIGHT MILK DEALERS HELD. Must Stand Trial on Charge of Violating Food Law.

Eight milk dealers were held in trial in the Morrisania Court yesterday for trial in the Special Sessions Court on charges of selling milk below the legal standard. Gels, No. 62 Eagle avenue; Amelio Damino, No. 682 East 143rd street; Adolph Katz, No. 406 Third avenue; Charles Schmitt, No. 1073 Washington avenue; Anna Sindlinger, No. 947 Washington avenue; and Benjamin Banesh, 126th street and Driggs avenue.

Declare for Cheapest Bridge. By the Merchants' Association was sent yesterday a letter to Controller Metz, asking him to take steps as a member of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to insure proper consideration of the several plans before the Bridge Department for Manhattan Bridge No. 3, with a view to selecting the best, cheapest and those that will admit most readily of construction. The association wants the seven million dollar bridge, and not the ten million dollar one, both of which are now being considered.

HANGS HIMSELF IN CELL. Louis Buonore, a grocer, accused of having cut his wife's throat at No. 383 Tenth avenue, on Sunday morning, and who was held in \$500 bail at the West Side Court to await the result of her injuries, was found hanging in his cell in the prison adjoining the court by a keeper named Madden early yesterday morning.

Gas Kills an Old Soldier. Charles Burns, sixty-five years old and a veteran of the civil war, was found asphyxiated by illuminating gas in his room at No. 325 West Forty-fourth street yesterday morning. The aged man, in going to bed, and accidentally left the gas jet partly opened.

Gas Hearing on Friday. Mayor McClellan will hold a public meeting on the eighty-cent gas bill at two o'clock on Friday afternoon in the Council chamber. It is expected this will be one of the largest hearings held this year on any bill sent down to the Mayor from Albany.

GLASS STAGGERS

Baggage Brought by the Moonland. Receives Extra Careful Examination on Pier.

RECENT ORDERS RESPONSIBLE. Collector Stranahan Says Spring Season Always Brings More of Such Violations to View.

Determination of customs officials toward petty smuggling by passengers on incoming ocean steamships was responsible for an extra careful examination of baggage on the Red Star line pier after the arrival of the Kronland yesterday. Two men and one woman, who fell under suspicion, were led back on board the steamship and closely questioned. No seizure was made, however.

There was much discussion in steamship circles yesterday over the recent orders to deal less leniently with attempts to evade the customs laws, and to make arrests in cases where there was an apparent attempt to smuggle. One customs inspector who has been in the service for years expressed the opinion that if the right of search were insisted upon it would lead to endless complications. He said that a great many women from an ignominious desire to get the better of the government would not hesitate on leaving ship to conceal something about them, though only, perhaps, a small article of value.

Collector Stranahan yesterday made light of the idea that any new orders had been issued by the collector's office.

It is only because the season is on when dressmakers, milliners and buyers return from Europe that the recent arrests noted in the papers have been made," he said. "Many of these persons are strictly honest and make their declarations and pay the duty assessed. On the other hand, some are likely to make an undervaluation of their goods, and to attempt to evade these articles. This happens every spring, and there has always been an arrest when a flagrant violation of the law has been detected."

Samuel Stein and his friend, Max Cohen, who was held in the service for years, were held in \$2,500 bail each for further examination by United States Commissioner Shields yesterday. The overcoat was found to contain material for a skirt and \$20 worth of lace.

RUNS DOWN TWO GIRLS. Mail Driver's Wagon Crushes Annie Goldstein and Ellen Friedlander on a Broadway Corner.

Annie Goldstein, sixteen years old, of No. 104 Goerck street, and Ellen Friedlander, fifteen years old, of No. 325 Stanton street, while on their way home from work soon after six o'clock last night were run over by a mail wagon driven by John Rogers, of No. 725 Washington street, at Canal street and Broadway.

The Goldstein girls thighs were badly lacerated and her companion suffered contusions of the breast and it is feared she has also suffered internal injuries. They were taken to the Hudson Street Hospital and attended by Dr. Willis us.

Both girls were attempting to cross Broadway when the mail wagon, which was engaged with another wagon and in attempting to elude the latter ran down the girls. Policemen Charles McNamara, of the City Hall station, arrested Rogers in order to prevent the mail from being delayed. He was then taken to the West Twelfth street station and held in \$1,000 bail.

ANOTHER S. P. C. A. INQUIRY. Committees to Examine Society's Finances and for Other Purposes To Be Named To-day.

Committees to examine the finances, to report upon a candidate for the place of president, made vacant by John P. Haines' retirement, to nominate the ten or eleven members of the board of directors, and to amend the by-laws, will be named to-day at a meeting of the Board of Managers of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

There will be heard the result of the investigation into the charges filed against the Haines management. "This report will not spare any one," said John H. Iselin yesterday, "and it is to be expected that hearing witnesses and we have told bald truths."

Nobody has become prominent as a candidate for the headship of the reorganized society. John Mason Knox, holding the post of secretary and treasurer, is to resign, and Henry Bergh, nephew of the founder, has been suggested for that office.
