MUST ACT TO SAVE FALLS OF NIAGARA

International Waterways Commission Reports to Congress That the Cataract Is Menaced.

WASHINGTON, Saturday.—If Niagara Falls is to be preserved as one of the wonders of the world immediate action by the United States and Canada is required, according to the findings of the American members of the International Waterways Commission, which has for the last year been studying the conditions at the Falls and in the tributary Great Lakes.

"The total quantity of water," the report says, "to be taken from the river by works now authorized is 60,000 cubic feet per second. Of this amount, 28,700 cubic feet is to be taken on the American side, and the remainder, 31,300 cubic feet, on the Canadian side.

"Improvements in the transmission of electric power and increased demand will make a market for all the power which can be developed at Niagara Falls, and will cause destruction of the Falls as it seems inevitable if the development be allowed to go uncontrolled.

"Works are now authorized and partially completed at the Falls which will divert from the Niagara River above the Falls more than double the quantity of water now flowing over the American Falls.

ARREST OF G. W. PERKINS

In This Way Mr. Jerome Will Seek to Decide the Question of Criminal Intent.

CHARGE WILL BE LARCENY

Facts Are To Be Placed Before a Magistrate and Then a Warrant Will Be Issued.

In view of the instructions given to the Grand Jury by Judge O'Sullivan, in General Sessions Court on Friday, when he said that body must be the judge as to whether or not there was criminal intent on the part of those life-insurance officials who gave their company's funds to political parties, District Attorney Jerome will take a decided stand to-morrow, that the whole question of the law may be thoroughly tested.

Mr. Jerome left the city early yesterday morning for his country home, in Lakeville, Conn., and was not at his office. During his absence he will decide on a plan of action, and this is likely to be the lines he mapped out when he asked Judge O'Sullivan to sit as a magistrate and hear the case of the people against George W. Perkins.

All the evidence which was taken before the Armstrong legislative committee, where Mr. Perkins admitted he had paid \$18,000 to Cornelius N. Bliss as treasurer of the National Republican Committee, will be placed in the form of depositions, and a warrant calling for the arrest of Mr. Perkins on a charge of larceny, will be prepared.
