Thirteen Survivors of Courrieres Mine Disaster Crawled Out After Twenty Days.

Lima, Peru, Friday.—After being entombed in the coal mines of the Courrieres district for twenty days, ever since the terrible explosion there, by which nearly twelve hundred men met their death, thirteen survivors crawled out of pit No. 2 to-day, very feeble and suffering from blood poisoning, but with sufficient vitality to insure their recovery. They state that there are other men alive in the mines, saying that they heard tapplings in different parts of the galleries, and salvage operations have been renewed, the members of the rescue corps carrying provisions in case other survivors are found.

LIVED ON DEAD HORSE

Others Said To Be Still Alive, Entombed in Galleries, and Work of Salvage is Renewed.

SEEKING OUTLETS IN VAIN



MRS. TEWKSBURY IN LONDON

Extradited from Paris and Arraigned at Bow Street on Charge of Passing Worthless Checks.

LONDON, Friday.—Mrs. Violet Tewksbury, who was arrested in this city in November, 1905, together with her husband, Lewis G. Tewksbury, charged with passing worthless checks and thereupon jumped her bail and fled from Paris, she was extradited today from Paris. She was arraigned at the Bow Street Police Court, where the Magistrate refused to release her on bail.

USTICA AGAIN SHAKEN

Severe Earthquake Shocks Destroy Walls Left Standing and People Leaving the Island.

CANNIBALISM IN ARCTIC TRAGEDY

Starvation Causes the Extinction of Two Tribes in the Extremity of Asia.

ST. PETERSBURG, Friday.—Horrible accounts are reaching St. Petersburg of cannibalism and starvation among tribes inhabiting the frozen Arctic plain of the Chukchi Peninsula, at the extremity of Asia. Most of the remainder died of starvation during the winter of 1904-1905, leaving the inhabitants without means of communication or food.

DEBT REDUCTION STRONGLY URGED

[SPECIAL CORRESPONDENCE OF THE HERALD.] SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic, March 30, 1906.—Advocates of the treaty pending between the United States and Santo Domingo were delighted that President Caceres should have called attention in his message to the large customs receipts of the last few months without intimating that the forty-five per cent set aside for running the government was not ample. It was feared by many persons that in account of the expense of the recent revolution and of buying up men who insisted upon continuing to fight unless they got money, the President might intimate that fifty-five per cent of the customs was more than Santo Domingo could afford to set aside for the payment of the foreign creditors.

APPEAL TO AVERT LIBERALS YIELD TO LABOR PARTY

Bill Providing Immunity for Union Funds Passes Its Second Reading in Parliament.

LONDON, Friday.—The government has surrendered to the labor party on the Trades Disputes bill and Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, the Prime Minister, himself announced in the House of Commons this afternoon that he would support the bill introduced by the labor party in opposition to the government measure. He addressed the House to accept the bill of the labor party, which then came up for its second reading. It provides complete immunity for trades unions' funds, the clause relating thereto reading:—"No action shall be brought against a trade union or other association aforesaid for the recovery of damages sustained by any person or persons by reason of the action of any member or members of such trade union or other association."
