


WOMEN'S CLUBS HOLDING INTERESTING MEETINGS.

PAGEANT AND TABLEAUX READY FOR THACKERAY CENTENARY

Four Performances To Be Given This Week for Benefit of Southern Schools.

FINAL arrangements of the tableaux and pageant committees for the Thackeray centenary were made at their meeting in the home of Mrs. Algernon Sidney Sullivan, of No. 16 West Eleventh street, on Tuesday night. The entertainment will be given for the benefit of the mountain schools supported by the Southern Industrial Educational Association and will take place in the Sixty-ninth Regiment Armory in the afternoons and evenings of Tuesday and Wednesday next.

Many prominent women of society and members of the younger set have manifested interest in it and old books of colored prints have been studied for weeks in search of proper costumes for the characters.

At all the performances Mr. Ben Great will read the prologue written by Mr. Percy Mackaye for the occasion, and on Tuesday evening Mr. Charles Forest Moore will make an address in memory of Thackeray.

The attractions for the first afternoon's programme will include a recitation by Mr. George Arliss, a selection from "Pennydunnis" by Mr. Louis Waller, Thackeray nursery rhymes, sung by Mr. Andrea Sarto, barytone, and Mrs. Brenda McCreas, the latter adding some English songs. A scene from the "Rose and the Ring" also will be a feature, with La Petite Julia danseuse, as little Rosinda. The second matinee will have the same programme, with the exception of Mr. Arliss and Mr. Waller, whose places will be taken by Miss Mollie Pearson, of "Bunty Pulls the Strings," Miss Mary Shaw and Miss Ruth Vivian.

Two tableaux each from "The New-comers," "Pennydunnis," "Henry Esmond," "The Virginians" and "Vanity Fair" will be the attractions each evening, with girls, matrons and men of society posing as the familiar characters.

Mrs. Livingston Rowe Schuyler, who is the secretary of the Southern Industrial Educational Association and who is a descendant of the Randolph family of Revolutionary days in Virginia, will appear in the tableaux of "The Virginians." Her gown will contain lace worn by Mrs. Randolph of one hundred years ago. Mrs. Margaretta Schuyler also will appear in the tableaux.

Mrs. William Cumming Story will take part in several tableaux and Mrs. Algernon Sidney Sullivan, president of the association, also will participate.

Miss Bessie P. Lee Hall is in charge of the arrangement and setting of the tableaux and has made a close study of Thackeray costumes. The professional artists for the first evening will be Mrs. Betty Brooke and Mr. Andrea Sarto, and on the second evening Mrs. Burns Roore will replace Mrs. Brooke. The pageant will introduce on the Terrace of Temple Garden all the participants in the tableaux, Terr's Tavern and the Vanity Fair Bazaar, which the Society of Virginians will present.

Dr. Walford Davies, organist of the Temple Church, London, England, has forwarded a manuscript of the "Little Billee" music, which has never been published. The armory will be made to resemble the old Temple Garden and the Fountain Court in London under the direction of the Municipal Art Society of New York.
